Fr. John writes.....



I was away on holiday in the summer when the great explosion in flag flying took place, well as a great lover of flags, as anyone who knows me will know, you would think I would be quite excited at the prospect. I have no doubt that the vast majority of folk who hung flags from lampposts and bridges, scaffolding and roundabouts did it all in good heart. But and I say, with the greatest respect and love to all, there were some folk, I have spoken to, who found the experience intimidating and

frightening. Indeed I know of cases where our flags have been "weaponised" against certain individuals. Intellectually it made me think, what have we done, that a symbol that is meant to visually represent our togetherness and unity; has been transformed, for some, into a symbol that represents almost exactly the opposite?

In preparation for Remembrance, I have been putting together the usual service book and updating the images to reflect the 80th Anniversary of VE and VJ Days. As I looked at historic images of the time, our national symbols were prevalent,

and when you looked at the faces in the crowds there was a true mix of faces of different genders, races, faiths and I have no doubt sexualities all rejoicing together because of the forces of unity, tolerance and goodwill had overcome the forces that wanted to impose intolerance and forced uniformity.



I understand we are in many ways a different nation to the one of 80 years ago. For my birthday I was bought a collection of DVDs of the Ealing Comedies, which are a delight to watch, Passport to Pimlico; Kind Hearts and Coronets, the Lavender Hill Mob, and my all-time favourite, the Ladykillers. They are a glimpse into a world that, rightly or wrongly, no longer exists. We need to look to the world we live in and bring forth the virtue and joys of that previous time but also overcoming its wrongs. The men and women who fought and died 80 years ago did so to make a better world, the landslide election of 1945 seems to me to show a sign that the people wanted, neither revolution nor status quo but a recognition that things had moved on and things needed to get better, change needed to be embraced not imposed or ignored.. as the flags are paraded and names remembered let's remember the hope of the new, in a world of tolerance and respect what they truly represent.

Extracts from Fr. John's recent Benefice newsletters ...

September 20th.

Plenty of time to still get down to the Christian Aid Book Sale in Irthlingborough this morning. But remember what happens at a book sale remains at a book sale.... Nobody saw me there and you definitely didn't see me buy any books, and all the books you see at the Rectory, you are sure you have seen on the bookshelves for years....if Mrs. Hall hadn't noticed them before, well that's to do with her lack on observation, not that they have been freshly bought! For those of us who will be in Church, it's St. Matthews's Day. St. Matthew was the local Taxman in Nazareth, and you can imagine a most unlikely person to follow Jesus. First century Palestinian tax collectors were seen as both corrupt; they would be given a target of money to collect.. by any means and anything above that target was theirs to keep.. And as enemy collaborators, (Rome was an occupying power), so for most folk the only real encounter with 'government' would be through these folk, taking money from them! Who knows quite what discontent or loneliness was going through St. Matthew's mind that day, but his encounter with Jesus changed everything.

September 27th.

Bright and early this morning as Mrs. Hall and I are off to watch my children run (I use the term in its broadest sense) in the Sheffield 10k 'Fun Run'. Anzhalika and I's plan is, of course, to watch them set of at the start line, cheer them on, and then go and find breakfast somewhere before returning a bit later to watch them cross the finish line! If only all my school cross-country races were as easy! (I am having a case of PTSD just thinking back on that time!).

Lots going on this week, Fr. Josh returns to work this week, no doubt full of tales of woe involving sleepless nights and exploding nappies.... Well that will keep Revd. Mich and I amused over the coming days and then Bishop Debbie will be joining us on Sunday 5th. October to lead our Harvest Festival Service. Been quite a while since Irthlingborough hosted our diocesan bishop, so I had better remind Revd. Mich to polish her shoes. During Harvest Festival we will be collecting tinned and dried food to go to the local Food Bank.

Our reading on Sunday is that famous story of the Rich Man and the Poor Man, Lazarus, in heaven and hell..., it ends with a challenge to us to listen to scripture, and a chilling prediction that folk are always willing to not let the facts get in the way of a good prejudice. A lesson that seems very relevant to today's society. Well, these trainers won't run themselves...

October 4th.

Well, tomorrow we celebrate Harvest Festival. I suspect it's safe to say that for the vast majority of us the direct connection with harvest into our lives (apart from maybe an allotment for some or veggie patch in the garden) is not maybe as directly connected in a "hands covered in mud kind of way". But no matter how distant it is, we are reliant on the harvest for all our food. It all has to be grown somewhere and someone somehow has harvested it at the start of the process of bringing it to our shelves, whether as fresh food, or frozen or tinned. The direct link may be lost but the consequence is very real. I think it was Einstein who said that if the bees disappear humanity has about 3 years left: i.e. no pollinators no growth, no growth no food. It's quite a shocking concept if you think about it, despite our technological advancement, we are all still so dependent on such basic things... Things so easy to take for granted. Harvest in my mind is the Thank You to the Creator God for that abundance, that is actually outside our control.

Well it's an exciting day tomorrow. Bishop Debbie will be joining us to both see Bubble Church and to lead our Harvest Communion in Irthlingborough, and a big thanks to Sharon who will play the organ for us, a rare treat! After the service we hope to plant at least some of our snow drops, I think as it stands we have somewhere around 700! Thank you for your generosity.

More from the magazine

From 1898 St. Peter's Church Magazine was published under a new format and known as 'Church and Home for Young and Old'. In the Hist Soc Archive we have original copies of the magazine for several years up to 1911. Rector at that time was Rev'd. John (Chippy) Kinnersley-Taylor, who certainly used the publication to express his views, usually strong ones, on all manner of matters concerning life in Irhlingborough. Sadly, we have no copies from the years of the Great War, which would have given a wonderful insight of life in the town at that time.

In 1898, excessive heat in late summer guaranteed a good harvest but farmers were castigated for '...being backward in sending corn to Church at Harvest Festival to signify their thanks.' To add to the Rector's annoyance, so depleted were our congregations due to Higham Feast, that only 9 shillings and a penny, or 46p. were deposited in the collection bags!

With over 100 pupils being absent with scarlet-fever the Church Schools closed in November but re-opened after a fortnight on advice of the Sanitary Authorities who did not consider that isolating affected children would prevent the illness spreading! A somewhat backward step as the schools did not re-open after Christmas until well into January, even causing the Jumble Sale to be postponed until July. All was not lost as flannel underwear was still available for purchase at the Rectory door on Thursday afternoons or evening, 'garments' at one shilling and nightshirts at two and thruppence. The deaths of 17 month old Ernest, 2 year old Elsie and Harry aged 7 were duly recorded. Most deaths at that time were marked with the tolling of the bell for which the bereaved family was required to pay one and six, or 7½p., dissenters being excluded unless the burial service was to be conducted by the Rector.

The Rector really didn't seem to have much time for dissenters but did assure his readers that '...we in the Church of England are not bigots or intolerant' but he did go on to rant '....some call themselves churchmen but they go to chapel!' He also issued a stern rebuke to parents for the scarcity of christenings by declaring, 'It is thoroughly disgraceful. Presumably this is 'up-to-date' religion as taught by such as have erred!' There had, in fact, been 58 christenings in 1902 so one cannot begin to imagine just how many would have satisfied the Rector.

Also postponed for six weeks was the Annual Sunday School Prize-giving. Large numbers attended Sunday School and Jennifer Lee was delighted to read that Ralph Hirons, her grandfather was a recipient in Class V111 together with George Green. He was also listed amongst 'The Regulars' attending the Church Schools, but special mention was made of Kate Hearn who received an extra special prize of a silver-plated inkstand for not missing even a half-day for seven years! In 1899 Matins was said every morning of the week in Church at 8:15am. and Evensong daily at 7:30pm. but even what the Rector described as his 'special

sermons' on Wednesday evenings attracted only a handful of parishioners. Holy Communion at 5:45am. on Ascension Day though was a different matter and was very well supported.

We are assured the Bishop was a total abstainer and he urged churches to mark the first Sunday in February as Temperance Society Sunday. The Rector sadly admitted that for a very long time Irthlingborough had not been able to do much to comply with such a request.

It is interesting to read that Mr. Dunmore's field at the top of Scarborough Street with its slopes and shady trees made an ideal venue for the Sunday School Treat in July, 1899.

The dawn of a new century and up went the cost of the magazine to tuppence, but a Children's Page, full of rather irrelevant information, was included. Did children really want to know that the Emperor of China regularly met his Cabinet Ministers at 2am., or that Sir Samuel Brown was led to invent the suspension bridge after carefully observing a spider's web, or even that the Lord High Chancellor's annual salary was ten thousand pounds?

The Church Lads Brigade in 1904 numbered some 40 youngsters, several of whom were busily saving thruppence a week to raise the 12 shillings, or 60p. required to enable them to join about two thousand others at the annual weeklong camp at Prestatyn. Meanwhile, the churchwardens had met with the gentlemen of the choir in order to decide the destination for the annual choir trip. Let us hope that the 10 ladies who the magazine listed as 'assisting the choir' approved of the choice of a train trip to Clacton.

Towards the end of the first decade of the century the great ambition to provide a Church Institute was finally realised. In April, 1910 Lord Annaly laid the foundation stone, having first aroused great interest by arriving in a motor car! In true Irthlingborough tradition, there then followed a public tea and a whist drive which required 50 tables. Building of the property took just three months and the opening ceremony was performed by the Earl of Sandwich. A clock and a large, framed copy of a letter from the Queen Mother graced the walls, but a plea was made for donations towards chairs which would cost 3 shillings, or 15p. each. I rather think that one or two of those wooden, rather uncomfortable chairs still lurk in the environs of St. Peter's!

St. Peter's Church magazines certainly contain a wealth of the town's social history and Hist Soc members have only chosen a very small selection for these last two articles. In the Archive we have the complete set of OUTLOOK, but if any older magazines do turn up at any time, please do consider donating them to our collection.
